

POETRY STUDY

(GR 5): Write a series of poems (unless it's a story) on one theme

Day 1:

IMMERSION/COLLECTING

READ POWERFUL POEM (Choose Touchstone Text(s) for teaching)

ML: Getting some ideas about poetry

Ralph Fletcher: Emotion, Image, Music **WNB:** Do thinking about what these words mean

WNB (COLLECTING) Find in your NB a word/sentence around which you feel, hear, and/or see something

Day 2:

IMMERSION AND SORTING/COLLECTING

ML: READ more poetry to demonstrate that poems come from something you feel deeply

BEGIN Working Definition (Noticing what seems to be essential about this genre)

Make poetry stacks that are comparable for each group. They will work with this same stack for several days. At the end of first day, have students record the books in their own stack so they can get them back again.

Be sure they have at least one book that tells a story that is NOT poetry

SORT Ask students to sort books into three stacks (into categories of their own choice). REPEAT with three different categories. If they do not come up with this category, add...

Hold/find a book with single author/single poem Hold/find book with single author/single theme

WNB (COLLECTING): Begin to make or find entries about things you feel deeply about

Day 3:

SIFTING/COLLECTING

ML: READ more poetry that highlights features of Fletcher 'expert definition' – emotion, image, music. Students SIFT OUT books that do NOT fit this definition. Take out books that are not poems. Take out Silverstein, Prelutsky, Suess, and other poems controlled by form (Haiku, Cinquain, etc.)

WNB (COLLECTING): Continue to make or find entries about things you feel deeply about

Day 4:

SECOND IMMERSION/CHOOSING A SEED

ML: Poets take a seed idea and live with it across lots of poems. READ a series of poems that does this.

Hold/find poetry book that tells a story

Hold/find poetry books with themes organized:

Around a single word

By senses

Feelings

Randomly (around a theme idea)

Around an event

Chronologically

Separated into categories

SIFT OUT all books but those by single author/single poem or single author/single theme (this will be like what you want them to do)

WNB: Choosing seed

Day 5:

NURTURING

ML: Poets love reading poetry. Read some of your favorites and tell students why.

Look through poetry books and find five poems you like a lot. Discuss with your group why you chose them. **WNB:** think more in writing about your discussion and what you want to remember about your favorite poems

Day 6: NURTURING

ML: Poets collect poems by their favorite poets

WNB: Look through poems again. Select five, copy (on copy machine or by hand if not too long) and put into

notebook. Leave space for pictures, draw them.

Day 7: DRAFTING

ML: Poets look at the world in special ways. Read: Byrd Baylor's The Other Way to Listen.

WNB: Drafting some poems

Day 8: DRAFTING

ML: Poets can use their own prose writing to craft poetry. Demo with own writing on overhead or chart

paper.

WNB: Continue to draft poems

Day 9-16 REVISION TRY-ITS (Refer to Georgia Heard's book for specific ML suggestions). Use touchstone sheet for

this teaching. Always suggest Try-its in notebooks during writing time.

Repetition (line, or word, or idea, or sound)

WNB: Try-its

Day 10 REVISION TRY-ITS

WNB: Try-its Repetition again (alliteration)

Day 11 REVISION TRY-ITS

WNB: Try-its Language: Poets say things in unusual ways (metaphor, simile)

Day 12 REVISION TRY-ITS Rhythm: Clap out rhythm and notice when we stop & keep going

Group students to perform poetry rhythms together.

Day 13 REVISION TRY-ITS Poets use line breaks and white space to slow poems down, to encourage reader to stop

and reflect, to set off poem's final line, to single out a line to surround it by silence, to make a break in

information.

WNB: Try-its

Day 14 REVISION TRY-ITS Line breaks and white space try-it (Valerie Worth lesson)

WNB: Try-its

Day 15 REVISION TRY-ITS Make the ordinary—EXTRAORDINARY! Poets paint pictures with words. They find

surprising ways ways.

WNB: Try-its Ordinary/Extraordinary T-chart for words from own poems

Day 16 REVISION TRY-ITS Poets craft punctuation to create rhythm.

WNB: Try-its Playing w/ punctuation to create rhythm

Day 17 REVISION TRY-ITS Poets say things in unusual ways: finding just the right words

WNB: Try-its Word choice. Finding exactly the right word (or making up words that fit meaning)

Day 18-21 All about writing. RE-ENVISIONING POEMS series of poems.

Day 22 Editing

Day 23 Publishing

Day 24 Celebration: Memorize one or two poems and recite to class.
